UAE SETS UP Dh100bn STIMULUS TO COUNTER EFFECTS OF COVID-19

New package comes as the world takes ever tougher steps in attempt to curb the outbreak



The Central Bank of the UAE rolled out a comprehensive Dh100 billion economic stimulus package yesterday to offset the effect of the coronavirus pandemic as authorities announced a halt to the issue of visas and a ban on flights to and from several countries.

"Given that the World Health Organisation has declared Covid-19 virus as a global pandemic, the Central Bank of the UAE has adopted a number of measures in an effort to support the economy and protect consumers," the central bank said.

The Targeted Economic Support Scheme includes Dh50bn from central bank funds through collateralised loans at zero cost to all banks operating in the UAE and Dh50bn in funds freed up from banks' capital buffers.

"The UAE banking system is adequately capitalised and banks maintain significant voluntary capital buffers in addition to the minimum prudential requirements," the bank said. "The draw-down of those voluntary buffers is not considered for the purposes of calculating the overall size of the economic support scheme."



Also yesterday, the UAE announced that three more people had recovered from the virus, bringing total recoveries to 23. Two Emiratis and an Indian were "symptom-free" after treatment, state news agency Wam reported. Saudi Arabia, howev-

er, announced 17 new cases.

Meanwhile, the Federal Authority for Identity and Citizenship said it would temporarily suspend the issue of visas for all travellers with the exception of diplomats, while the General Civil Aviation Authority said

flights to and from Lebanon, Iraq, Syria and Turkey would be banned. The GCAA on Friday banned flights between the UAE and all destinations in Italy apart from Rome.

Christchurch terror attack memorial is cancelled

A national remembrance day in New Zealand to mark the first anniversary of the Christchurch mosque attacks was cancelled because of the coronavirus outbreak.

Several thousand people, many from overseas, had been expecting to attend the service to mark the shootings, in which 51 people were killed and hundreds wounded during Friday prayers.

New Zealand Prime Minister Jacinda Ardern said that the country had "fundamentally changed" in the wake of the attacks.

She said, however, that the nation needs to continue to call out racism and challenge the growing threat from far-right extremism.

Announcing the decision yesterday, Ms Ardern said: "We're very saddened to cancel but remembering such a terrible tragedy, we shouldn't create a risk of further harm being done."

Ms Ardern said that engagement with the Muslim community had grown since the massacre at Al Noor Mosque and Linwood Islamic Centre.


